PROPERTY TAX TIME LOOMS LARGE ONCE AGAIN!!!!

The second installment of property taxes will be due on May 1, 2010. May 1 falls on a Saturday this year, so the office will be open on Saturday from 8:00AM–6:00PM for your convenience.

This being the second installment, should your payment be late, your account will be turned over to the delinquent tax collector and interest and penalty will be added to the amount due.

As mentioned in the Town Report, I would appreciate your not asking me, or assuming that I can or will forgive the interest and penalty. You all as voters in the Town of Corn-

wall vote on the due dates and the interest and penalty amounts every year, so please don't give me authority that I don't have.

GREEN UP DAY, MAY 1, 2010

Thank you to the early birders who have already spruced up the roadsides. Forty years ago, the first Green Up Day was actually in April. Because there was still snow on the ground on April 17, 1970, the tradition of Green Up Day moved to the first Saturday in May. Although the headquarters in Montpelier has received several phone calls over the past couple of years from Green Up coordinators across the state suggesting that

it might be time to try April again, this year's Green Up Day will be Saturday, May 1st.

The bags are in early this year, along with gloves and a few day-glo vests. Please stop by Town Hall to get your bag and indicate on the town map where you plan to Green Up. Also, bags will go home with students at the Cornwall School. The Vermont AOT sends crews out

to clean up the state highways (125, 30, 74). Two town trucks will be in the Town Hall parking lot: one for Green Up Day trash and the other for Green Up Day scrap metal. Please honor the Green Up spirit and remember the trucks are for debris from our roadsides and not our sheds, barns and garages!

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
CORNWALL HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT NEWS



Invasive specie??

So it has been a great spring for the roads. About the only mud was what I made with the shoulder disks, sorry about that. Despite the short term mess, it is a very effective tool for managing the road's profile and shoulders. It helps reclaim some gravel lost during the winter plowing. This years' plowing conditions were often poor and a lot of loose gravel was cast. One of the joys of living on a gravel road I guess.

You'll see in this newsletter a notice of a permit request to apply herbicides in the Town Right of Way. Before you granola crunchers get your shorts in a twist, hear me out. We're not bringing in aircraft or even trucks with s pray booms to decimate the roadsides. This will be extremely selective using hand held equipment. Primarily stump treatment of cut trees and brush to control regrowth and some foliar treatment of invasive species, poison ivy and other noxious weeds and brush where mowing is not



We'll be out of gravel money here shortly, so mowing should start in good season (see Integrated Vegetation Management Plan at the Town Hall).

The plan is to pave some or all of Swamp Road depending on grant funding (not expected).

Again, depending on a grant, we will replace a culvert at the Bolduc Farm on West Street.

We will be upgrading a culvert at Payne's on West Street as well.

The town received a Better Back Roads Grant to upgrade a culvert and do some stone lined ditches at Beaver Brook on Sperry Road.

Woe is me though, the geothermal grant flopped. Now I don't get to do anymore bureaucratic BS and we didn't create or save that .237th of a job. Woe is me. Still plan to do the generator set though.

Back to the Right of Way permit for a minute. I am happy to, actually have to, discuss specifics and site related issues. If you want to rip the strategy and philosophy, that may not go so well. Just saying up front.

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The Towns of Addison, Bridport, Cornwall and Starksboro

PUBLIC NOTICE HERBICIDE SPRAYING

The above mentioned towns have each requested from the Secretary of the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets a permit to apply the following herbicides: Crossbow (2,4-dichlorophenoxy acetic acid), Forefront (2,4-dichlorophenoxy acetic acid) and Makaze (glyphosate) to control unwanted vegetation along town owned highways. Selective spray operations will start approximately May 15th. The applications will be made by certified pesticide applicators using mechanically controlled equipment and hand control methods. Residents along the right-of-way are encouraged to protect sensitive environmental areas, organic farm land and water supplies from spray. It is the resident's responsibility to notify the town of the existence of these situations adjacent to the town right-of-way. SELECT BOARD NEWS AND INFORMATION

"T" Tall retired from the Select Board completing 22 years of service to our community. Thank you, "T"! Judy Watts, recently retired from the College library, was elected to fill that position. Joe Severy turned over the Chair responsibilities to Bruce Hiland.

Town Meeting was uneventful with modest attendance. As announced we asked for but didn't get the State/Federal grant for a geothermal system and back-up generator at the town garage. Consequently we'll not be spending the \$10,500 in matching funds approved at Town

Meeting and will consider our options for the garage.

Along the way we have:

- Moved ahead in the legal process required to deal with one taxpayer's unresolved grievances regarding three properties:
- Agreed to proceed to tax sale in several delinquent tax collection cases;

- Worked with the State, Regional Planning and residents to improve the Route 74/Route 30 intersection;
- Appointed Jim Duclos to replace Mike Brinkman as Zoning Administrator.

As of this writing we have no idea what havoc may ensue for the Town as the State government deals with its budget woes.



A few numbers to throw out for your information. As of April 13, Cornwall is showing a 78 % participation rate, which is a step above all of the surrounding towns with Weybridge at 74%, Middlebury at 67%, Shoreham at 61%, Salisbury at 75%, Whiting at 55%, New Haven at 74%, Ripton at 58% and Bridport at 48%.

The national participation rate currently is 66%. The state of Vermont's participation is at 62% and Addison County is at 65%.



The system is called the *Cornwall Connection* and will be managed by the Town Clerk. It will be used to send e-mail messages about important events, deadlines, emergency situations and other matters of particular significance in the Town.
