Conservation Commission News

What's Happening with the Conservation Commission

The Cornwall Conservation Commission has some interesting projects we are working on and a few upcoming events of interest.

The Cornwall and Ripton Conservation Commissions cosponsored a two-session workshop about **BioFinder**, an online mapping tool that locates places in Vermont most important for maintaining biodiversity. The site includes maps of Vermont's connected forests and waterways, locations of important ecological resources, and other information that can be used for conservation planning. Participants from all parts of Addison County attended the training.

In Cornwall this winter, over 80

residents came together to give input on the community values mapping project, which noted places in town that are important for hunting, recreation, scenic and historic values among others. The Cornwall Conservation Commission is joining with residents interested in establishing walking trails in Cornwall that can be used by the public. Sue will talk to us about these elusive felines, their habitat needs, and the role they play in Cornwall ecology. Sue is the founder of Keeping Track, an organization devoted to training professional biologists and citizen scientists in wildlife monitoring skills.

Update on the Swamp Road Bridge Replacement

"At our March Town Meeting, we had some discussion of the process and timeline for replacing the Swamp Road Covered Bridge, and the Select Board has asked me to update that report. As many of you know, the bridge is jointly owned by Cornwall and Salisbury and the towns are in the process of finalizing our rental contract with VTrans for the temporary Bailey Bridge, which went into service early this year. The bridge rental agreement is currently in attorney review.

Planning for a permanent replacement bridge will require coordination between Cornwall and Salisbury, which can be challenging given the needs and resources of each town. For instance, the chair of the Salisbury Select Board has indicated that Salisbury is currently dealing with financing and construction of a different Salisbury bridge, the replacement of which was put in motion prior to the Swamp Road Covered Bridge fire. Salisbury advises that its other bridge project will be complete in the next 30 days and it will not be considering the Swamp Road Covered Bridge until after that. Because Cornwall and Salisbury must agree on a replacement design, the planning process cannot realistically begin until Salisbury begins its internal discussions. We will continue to update Cornwall residents as we learn more.

2017 Herbicide Spraying Notice

THE TOWNS OF ADDISON, BRIDPORT, CORNWALL, SHOREHAM AND STARKSBORO

2017 PUBLIC NOTICE

HERBICIDE SPRAYING

The above-mentioned municipalities have each requested from the Secretary of the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets a permit to apply the following herbicides: Garlon 4 ultra (Triclopyr), Oust Extra (Sulfometuron) and Rodeo (Glyphosate) to control unwanted vegetation along town owned highways. Selective spray operations will start approximately May 20th. The applications will be made by certified pesticide applicators using mechanically controlled equipment and hand control methods. Residents along the right-of-way are encouraged to protect sensitive environmental areas, organic farm land and water supplies from spray. It is the resident's responsibility to notify the town of the existence of these situations adjacent to the town right-of-way. Property Taxes, Dog Licenses & Green Up Day

Some timely reminders:

Firstly:

The second installment of Property Taxes are due on Monday, May 1, 2017. The office will be open on Monday from 8 AM—6 PM. Postmarks are accepted as on time payments. Just a reminder that if the second payment is late, the taxes are considered delinquent and will be forwarded to our delinquent tax collector. There is an 8% penalty along with the 1% interest per month. I apologize for not sending out a reminder this year. It just didn't seem to work into the schedule.

Next:

Dog licenses were due on April 1, but I gave everyone a break until the end of April since I was moving the office back into the Town Hall. I will be putting together a list of "delinquent" dog owners for the Selectboard to review at their first meeting in May, so I would appreciate it if you could get your dogs licensed in the very near future.

Lastly:

Green Up Day is May 6 this year. The trucks will be up at the school parking lot starting Friday night, and will be there all weekend. The map and bags are available at the Town Hall.
