#### **Conservation Commission News**

The Conservation Commission continues to work on several fronts.

In August, we met with the Planning Commission to discuss their work on updating the town's zoning bylaws. The CC asked that the new bylaws be written so as to better protect Cornwall's significant natural features. This would include the 13 sites identified in the 2015 Cornwall Ecological Inventory, key connectivity habitat, and riparian areas important for water quality and flood abatement. We feel that protecting these resources is critical for wildlife and biological diversity, and will help keep our town the special and scenic place it is.

The Trails Committee continues to explore potential walking trails in Cornwall, including the possibility of starting work this fall on a short path along the northern

edge of the Douglas Pond property and working with the State on an access route into Cornwall Swamp. In addition, some private landowners have kindly indicated that they might be agreeable to having residents walk the trails on their property. Let us know if you are interested in joining the Trails Committee as it works on this.

Looking ahead, the CC will be sponsoring a Clayplain Forest walk led by Marc Lapin on Sunday, October 15<sup>th</sup> (1:30-3:30 pm.) Come explore one of Cornwall's finest examples of a very rare ecosystem, a Valley Clayplain Forest natural community. We will learn about its plants and soils and investigate the principles of landscape connectivity. This special area is a fine example of a hemlock-hardwood clayplain forest and abuts a rich wetland complex, all part of the Beaver Brook

watershed, a major tributary of the Lemon Fair River. There is parking close to the forest site. Take Rte 125 to Foote Farm Road, turn onto FFR and then left again on Beaver Pond Road (approx. 700 ft). Vehicles can be parked along the circle at the end of Beaver Pond Road. Please, no dogs.

Sue Morse's informative and fun slideshows about "Bobcats" thrilled both young and old last spring. The CC is hoping that residents will have another chance to see her in action this fall, this time focusing on the "Wild Cousins of Our Best Friends: Wolves, Coyotes and Foxes." Please stay tuned.

### Cornwall Clayplain Forest Walk

You are invited to join the Conservation Commission's Marc Lapin for a

guided walk through one of Cornwall's finest examples of a Valley Clayplain Forest natural community.

Explore this hemlock-hardwood forest that abuts a rich

wetland complex, all part of the Beaver Brook watershed, a major tributary of

the Lemon Fair River. We will learn about its plants and soils and investigate the principles of landscape connectivity. Clayplain Forests, once common across the Champlain Valley, are now rare and listed as "threatened" in Vermont.

The walk is scheduled for **Sunday, October 15<sup>th</sup> from 1:30-3:30 pm**. There is parking close to the forest site. Take Rt 125 to Foote Farm Road, turn onto FFR, and then left again on Beaver Pond Road (approx. 700 ft). Vehicles can be parked along the circle at the end of Beaver Pond Road. Please, no dogs.

#### PLAYGROUND UPDATE

Due to the hard work and contributions of many Cornwallians, we have some wonderful new features on the playground, including Peet's Playhouse (in honor of Cindy Peet's service on the Cornwall School Board), a Hobbit House, volcano, snake, adjustable basketball hoops, and some trees. #### INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE

Cornwall School was approved for candidacy by International Baccalaureate in the late spring to become an IB World School in the Primary Years Programme (PYP). The work towards candidacy has framed the start of our year, so far, as teachers had a three day training in August before school began on the philosophy and curriculum of the PYP. Since then, we have been exploring the IB Learner Profile (<a href="http://bit.ly/IB-LP">http://bit.ly/IB-LP</a>) in classes and as a whole school. Students have been thinking about what attributes are strengths for them, how the learner profile fits into our school essential agreements, and what examples of the attributes are at Cornwall School. In our all school meetings, we are focusing on one attribute each month. In September, the focus has been on the attribute of caring. The IB Learner Profile also supports the work that we are doing with mindfulness, as we learn and practice breathing and movement strategies to develop each of us a clearer sense of how we are feeling and awareness of what is going on around us. We will continue working with other ACSD elementary schools on the written curriculum over the course of this year and next. More on this in a future newsletter.

#### **FARM TO SCHOOL**

Over the last month, there has been a lot of farm to school learning at Cornwall School, which has been supported by our \$10,000 Farm to School implementation grant. The 3rd and 4th graders have spent Wednesdays at the Middlebury College garden, integrating math, storytelling, writing, science, technology, and social emotional learning into the farm to school elements of food, farms, and nutrition. We also have 4 new residents out by the garden: Lady Rose, Rover, Bambi, and Harriet hatched as chicks here in the spring and are now part of our farm to school program. Classes have also harvested potatoes, tomatoes, green beans, beets, onions, and more from our garden that we have used for lunch. Through this work, students have practiced cooperation, persistence, communication, and other transferable skills as well as learned about science. This work will be celebrated at our Harvest Fest on 17 October. If you are interested in coming to Harvest Fest, please contact Jen.
