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ELECTION SEASON IS UPON US!!

Wanted to start this quarter's newsletter with information about the upcoming elections. There will be a State Primary on August 14, 2018 and the General Election will be held on November 6, 2018.

Early/Absentee voting is in full swing for the State Primary. Ballots are available in person at the Town Hall, by phone or by mail. An absentee ballot can also be requested through the Secretary of State's MY VOTER PAGE. Only the voter can pick up their ballots. Requests can be made by a family member, but the ballots must be mailed to the voter.

Absentee/Early ballots will be available until 3:00 PM

on Monday, August 13, 2018. The office will be open on Monday, August 13 from 1:00-3:00 pm. Any absentee/early ballots must be returned by 7 PM on Tuesday, August 14. The state primary is different from the Presidential Primary. You will be given three ballots, Democratic, Progressive and Republican. You will decide which one you will vote on. The voted ballot will be put through the tabulator and the two unvoted ballots will go in a separate ballot box.

Beginning with the State Primary, there will be new accessibility technology available. Sample ballots are posted around town for your review. Moving on to the General Election. I mostly want to make sure that the town committees take note that they should be holding a Justice of the Peace caucus very soon and that anyone who would like to be on the ballot as an Independent JP, must complete a Consent of Candidate Form and a Petition/Statement of Nomination form. Cornwall candidates must obtain a minimum of 10 signatures of registered voters, and file the forms with the Town Clerk by 5 PM on August 17, 2018.



CORNWALL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT NETWORK

A working group created by the State of Vermont to update the Local Emergency Operations Plan (LEOP) which is reviewed and signed by the Selectboard on an annual basis has completed their work and the new document is now called the Local Emergency Management Plan (LEMP). Each town will have to create their plan and have the Selectboard review and sign off by May 1 of each year. In order to accomplish this task, the Emergency Management Network needs to resume

meeting to create this document and discuss any other emergency planning issues for the town. If you have an interest in being a part of this group, please contact Sue Johnson at the Town Clerk's office, 462-2775. A meeting will be planned for September of 2018.

CORNWALL CONSERVATION COMMISSION NEWS

When you're at the Town Hall, please take a look at the new Conservation Corner display. You will find all kinds of information there including an oversize aerial map of the town, which we felt would be of interest.

The Conservation Commission is beginning work on a new initiative and we are hoping for help! We want to learn more about the routes wildlife take as they travel through the town to find food, to mate, and to raise their young. The 2015 Cornwall Ecological Inventory contains some information about potential connectivity routes that link the town's forest blocks. This data was based on residents' wildlife travel corridor notes and GIS inventory landscape analysis. We would like to verify this information and to study the safety of crossings where paths cross a town road. Accurate data about wildlife travel corridors will assist in protecting these routes. But, the first step is field verification.... a task we are planning to begin in the months ahead. We welcome your participation.

The CC has continued to offer assistance and recommendations to the Planning Commission as it completes work on the new Zoning By-Laws and

Subdivision Regulations.
Recognizing our town's
significant natural features
and providing protection
for them is critical for wildlife and biological diversity,
and will help keep our
town the special, scenic
place it is. We also continue to complete natural
resource reviews of development applications for
the Development Review
Board.

When you're at the Town Hall, please take a look at the new Conservation Corner display. You will find all kinds of information there including an oversize aerial map of the town, which we felt would be of interest. There are many stars representing where bobcats have been sighted in Cornwall. You are invited to add new stars for 2018 sightings. We are fortunate to live in a place sufficiently natural and undeveloped that it supports a breeding population of these amazing feline predators.

As we look to the year ahead, we are planning to add at least one new person to the Conservation Commission. Our most recent activities are described above, but all of our efforts are focused on the protection and preservation of the town's important natural features including native plants, animals, and natural communities of ecological importance. We are putting out a call to Cornwall residents who are interested in working with us on conservation issues. Please let us know if you'd like to join us.

Cornwall Church and what is going on—

One of the wonderful opportunities that folks may like to participate in is the Fifth Sunday activities. On the fifth Sunday of any month (the next to be on July 29) everyone shows up at the regular time of 9:30 a.m. and instead of a regular service folks are greeted by activities that make a difference in Addison County. Among the jobs are sorting foods into the smaller packages for HOPE. Follow us on Facebook to stay up-to-date with what is happening.

Many folks have read the article in the Addison Independent about the Cornwall Church looking at the future for the church building and for the congregation that meets in that space. Erroneously, some have interpreted that article to mean that the doors are closing on this church. The building has been a fixture in the community for more than 200 years and the community has always taken care of this fine example of early New England culture. For those interested in learning more about this building, Mary Peet Green wrote a delightful history of the church.

While that beautiful building was being built, Ohio was admitted as the 17th stated joining in the Union, Beethoven was writing Symphony No. 3 and Ralph Waldo Emerson was born. It was 26 years after Vermont had outlawed slavery, but many years before the Civil War would bring challenges and divisions. Vermont's population was a quarter of what

it is today. This is more than the stats of the day.

Just as this building reflects the history of our community, we are writing new chapters. In years now gone by, church attendance was practiced by nearly everyone in the community. The church was a place of worship and it was the community. Sunday was a day set aside. This is a different time with interests, demands, and opportunities that were never even a part of our parents', grandparents', and more distant relatives' imaginations. The pilgrims may be a bit surprised to hear that according to the Pew Research Center, New England is the least churched region of the United States.

All this rhetoric leads to some of the discussions that the Cornwall Congregation is holding. The membership is small but dedicated to the congregational community and the building. While we have these discussions know that the church is still

open and welcoming to all.
