A WELL DESERVED TRIBUTE TO MILLIE LONGEY, FORMER LONGEY'S COUNTRY STORE OWNER AND FIRE DEPARTMENT DISPATCHER

Mildred 'Millie' Ilene (Delphia) Longey, 96, of Middlebury, died on Sunday evening, March 12, 2023, at Shard Villa after a short illness. Millie was born on Seminary Street in Middlebury, Vt., on April 2, 1926, the daughter of Warren and Cecilia (Maheu) Delphia. She lived since March 2022 at Shard Villa in Salisbury, Vt., and from 2004-2022 at The Meadows in Middlebury.

Excerpt from the 2003 Cornwall Town Report dedicated to Millie:

Millie Longey's contributions to the Town of Cornwall were numerous in her over forty years as a member of this community. She and her late husband Hugh owned and operated Longey's Country Store from 1959-1988. For some folks in the community, it was their first introduction to town and usually involved a quick history lesson about the town or the house into which they had moved.

To the Cornwall Volunteer Fire Department, Millie was our contact person. She had been the voice of base '901' for many years. She was instrumental in organizing bazaars, barbecues, rummage sales, and our capital fund drive for the Route 30 station. She was in charge of the department's social events. For many years, she and Hugh would have us at their home for our annual dinners. Millie also was a help to the Highway Department and was Assistant Fire Warden.

At her surprise retirement party in September 2003, the Fire Department honored Millie by naming her a Life Member. At our annual dinner in early February 2004, she was

once again surprised by receiving a Certificate of Recognition from the Vermont State Firefighters Association for her Outstanding Contributions to the Fire Service.

Millie's outstanding volunteer spirit and contributions to the Town of Cornwall will remain in our hearts and memories for years to come. He amazing service to the town was greatly appreciated.



TOWN CLERK—TREASURER UPDATES!

Happy Spring to Everyone! A few remarks and reminders!!!

- **RETIREMENT:** Well.... I am now counting the days to retirement. I will be done after Town Meeting of 2024. The thought of retiring is both bitter sweet and very exciting. I will miss my fellow town officials and my constituents. I am looking forward to a bit more free time and accomplishing a multitude of projects at home. I am going to enjoy this last year in the office and I hope to accomplish a few things for the Town of Cornwall before I walk off into the sunset!!
- VACANCIES: There are still a few vacancies for town officials. We need a delegate and two alternates to the Addison County Regional Planning Commission and an alternate to the Solid Waste District. There are two openings on the DRB for Alternates. David Dodge would like to retire from the Lemon Fair Insect Control District, so we are looking for an interested person to replace him. There are also vacancies on the Planning Commission and Cemetery Commission. There are two Justice of the Peace vacancies as well.
- **SECOND INSTALLMENT OF PROPERTY TAXES:** The second installment of property taxes is due on May 15, 2023. May 15 is on a Monday, so the office will be open from 9:00 AM—5:00 PM. You should have received a copy of your tax bill in the mail recently. This can be used as a reminder or if you need information for your income tax return, it can supply that as well. Thank you in advance for your timely payments.
- **DOG LICENSES DUE:** Dog licensing is still ongoing. Dog licenses are due each year by April 1. A current rabies certificate is required to obtain the license. I do keep the rabies certificates on file until their expiration date. The transaction can all be done by mail if that works better for you. Spayed/Neutered dogs \$9.00. Intact dogs \$11.00.
- **GREEN UP DAY:** Green Up Day is planned for Saturday, May 6, 2023. The town trucks will be up at the Cornwall School by early Saturday morning. They will remain there until Sunday night or early Monday morning. Sue Johnson will be set up near the trucks on Saturday morning from 8 AM—Noon with extra bags and other supplies. The table with supplies will remain for the rest of the day on Saturday. Green Up bags will be available at the town hall starting on April 11 during regular office hours (Tuesday—Friday 9 am—5 pm). There will also be a map of Cornwall for you to mark the road you will be greening up. This way we can cover the town and not have duplication.
- MAY 6, 2023: May 6 is going to be a busy day in Cornwall. You will see notices elsewhere in the newsletter, but as a reminder: Green Up Day is happening, Recreation Committee bake sale at the school during the Green Up events. Open house at the D A R building At 1:00 pm and a free piano concert at the Cornwall Congregational Church at 3:00 PM. Take note of the information about these events elsewhere in the newsletter.

MESSAGE FROM OUR FIRE WARDEN, TOMMY FRANKOVIC

From your Town Fire Warden:

Another spring is here, and I've already permitted several burns throughout our Town in favorable conditions.

However, with the retreating, almost non-existent snowpack, higher temperatures, decreasing humidity, etc.,

the availability of safe and optimal burn opportunities is rapidly decreasing.

Every morning at 0645, the Vermont Agency of Natural Resources sends an email to every Fire Warden in the state notifying us of fire danger levels. As of today, March 29, for example, Cornwall which is a part of Zone-3 is considered a moderate wildland fire risk. Already.

Also, counties in New York and New Hampshire which share the same weather patterns as Vermont have already instituted a total outdoor burn ban until May 15. This is not outside the realm of possibility for Cornwall. Everything is dependent on weather, the recommendations from the State, and my discretion as Fire Warden.

So please. Be safe, be aware, be in contact, and be patient. My thanks to all!

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

Professor Alexis Mychajliw at Cornwall School:

Prof. Alexis Mychajliw from the Middlebury College Biology Department gave a talk at Cornwall School on March 9th about Vermont's extinct megafauna. We learned about the Mt Holly Woolly Mammoth, the Charlotte whale, and Alexis' ongoing search for fossils of the giant beaver (which was about the size of a bear!). If you find any fossils, please let the Cornwall Conservation Commission know!

Green Up Day (May 6) Events:

Do you have ash trees on your property? You can learn about the invasive Emerald Ash Borer insect that is attacking our native ash trees at the drop off site for Green Up Day. We will have information on how to identify ash trees and signs of EAB damage as well as information regarding what you can do. In addition, we'll have information about invasive plant species (some examples include buckthorn, honeysuckle, wild (poison) parsnip) in Cornwall and have the removal tools that can be checked out of the library on hand for you to take a look at.

The CC will also be sponsoring its 2nd Annual Clean Up of the Swamp Rd parking area adjacent to Otter Creek, as well as some portions of Swamp Rd to the east of the creek. We'll send out more details in mid April, but please feel free to send questions to cornwallconservationvt@gmail.com

Fireflies of Cornwall Event July 1:

Professor Greg Pask of Middlebury College will lead us on an exploration of the firefly population here in Cornwall. In addition to their spectacular nighttime displays, fireflies play an important role in the propagation of many flowering plants with diets consisting primarily of pollen and nectar. In the evening of July 1, we'll gather to learn about their habits and importance in the local environment. Greg will bring his blacklighting setup to attract fireflies for us to examine up close! Keep an eye out for more information in early June!

Amphibian Monitoring on West Street:

Again this spring, volunteers have been out on West Street, slowing traffic, and making sure that these small creatures cross safely from their winter hibernation areas in the woods on the east side of the Street to breeding areas in ponds and wetlands just to its west. Wood frogs and spring peepers are first to emerge here en masse, followed later by blue-spotted and Jefferson salamanders. Migration is weather dependent, happening after dark, on rainy spring evenings when temperatures are at or above 40 degrees. By the time this newsletter reaches Cornwall homes, the peak window for this migration (mid-March to mid-April) to the breeding areas will be over for this year. LEMON FAIR INSECT CONTROL DISTRICT REPORT

LFICD Field Coordinator/Biologist 2023 Spring Report. As of this writing, there is still snow on the ground and more in the mountains. As the snow begins to melt, we begin to see swamps and floodplains filled with water. That becomes the official start of "mosquito season." Fortunately, the first mosquitoes of the season don't pose much of a threat. They are considered "snow melt mosquitoes" i.e., Ochelrotatus stimulans. They stay relatively close to the wetland habitat from which they're born. We begin to see larvae concentrate at the same time Maple tree flowers are beginning to fall from the trees. They're a valuable source of food for returning neo-tropical birds and amphibians. We'll be keeping an eye open and conducting regular surveillance beginning at the end of March. Important to remember: As temperatures begin to rise and rain events become more regular, be sure to "Tip and Drain!" containers to prevent mosquitoes from laying their eggs on your property. Examples of containers include 5gallon pails, wheelbarrows, wagons, flowerpots, clogged gutters, plastic tarps covering wood piles, boats... tires, rainwater collection barrels... Certain mosquitoes prefer to lay their eggs in open containers. One is *Culex pipiens*, a mosquito that is a potential vector for West Nile Virus! By removing this kind of breeding habitat on your property, you reduce the risk of both annoyance and disease.

LFICD Summer Interns. The advertisement is out on HandShake (an online recruiting platform) for college students to apply for our field tech./lab internships. We can take on two interns. This "boots on the ground" opportunity has proven very beneficial to both the LFICD and the interns. We look forward to working with them again.

LFICD Open House. This year we will once again host an Open House in Weybridge at our field lab/office located behind the Weybridge Congregational Church (the enclosed portion of the old carriage shed). This is an opportunity for you to come and see the good work that is being done by the LFICD and ask questions, among many engaging activities and refreshments. The date for this year's Open House will be July 22. Look for upcoming details on our website and in the local paper and Front Porch Forum.

LFICD Board. Alissa Shethar (Bridport) announced her resignation as of the end of March. We are very appreciative of all her efforts on creating imaginative anti-mosquito posters and brochures and maintaining our website. CORNWALL VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The CVFD serves the town primarily as an emergency first responder. Yes, we fight fires but more often our members are first on scene for medical emergencies. We work in close collaboration with our local ambulance service - MREMS, we respond to motor vehicle accidents, we help to safely direct traffic around emergency scenes, we need to maintain the array of tools and equipment we use for these events, we write reports, and we do book keeping. We would like to increase our ability to do all of this and more but *we need your help*.

You can join the fire department and never step into a burning building or take anyone's vitals. But of course that's always an option! If you're curious about how you can help the department in as little as a few hours a month, please consider coming to our open house on May 13th.

E911 Signage - In an emergency, clearly marked house numbers are *critically important* to First Responders. If you need assistance in obtaining and installing a standard green and white E911 sign at your home, do not hesitate to contact the CVFD for assistance. Firefighter Ken Manchester can help! Give him a call at 462-2136 or talk to any member of the department!

Alarm Systems - Do you have an alarm system at your house? If you do, please consider investing in a Knox Box to ensure timely access to your home. This device, which can only be opened by the CVFD, holds keys and important information about accessing your home in an emergency.

Alarm batteries - Do your smoke and CO detectors need fresh batteries? If so, please change them twice a year. Consider doing so on solstices or time changes, it's an easy way to remember!



PLANNING COMMISSION NEWS!!

The Cornwall Planning Commission has been busy since our last update. After a January hearing for the Town Plan update and a few changes based on community input, we've approved the current draft for adoption. We've passed the document to the Select Board for their consideration next. The document will be reviewed by the Select Board and if adopted by them, the town will have a new edition of the Town Plan passed to the Regional Planning Commission for approval. This update started in the fall of 2020 with the successful application for the Municipal Planning Grant and has been worked on consistently since then.

As the Planning Commission forges ahead, we are reviewing the Implementation section of the Town Plan. This final chapter of the document pulls from the analysis written throughout the plan and encourages particular actions for the town to consider or undertake. This spring we are reviewing these and setting some goals for the next year.

Currently there are goals for each of the sections of the town plan which can be briefly described as follows:

Better understand affordability challenges and opportunities

Further support home-based businesses

Reinforce our historic settlement land-use pattern

Preserve the working landscape

Development of local childcare opportunities

Promote renewable and local energy generation

Increase local recreation opportunities

Strengthen our conservation efforts

Our April 19 meeting will be about reviewing these areas of the plan and the associated action steps. If any of these topics interest you, please review the draft available on the Town website. The Implementation section is found on pages 130-134.

Our meetings are hybrid-style - at the town hall and Zoom. Please feel free to attend.

Cornwall has officially been scheduled for the **PLAY EVERY TOWN VERMONT** project. http://playeverytown.com/ Pianist and UVM music professor David Feurzeig will play a free piano concert in every town in Vermont May 2022-Dec 2026. That's an impressive 251 concerts! About 25 concerts have already taken place, and we are excited to be the first in the Middlebury area. On his website, David states, ".....the sense of community and local place is threatened here as everywhere. I want to support the vibrancy of village centers and downtowns by performing in places live music isn't often heard anymore. In that spirit, I will tailor each concert to its place in some way, by accompanying a local musician in a piece or two, or playing music by a local composer where possible. Every program will be different at least in some part."

The Cornwall Congregational Church has recently acquired a beautifully restored Steinway concert piano and is proud to host this first public concert using the piano. Composer-pianist David Feurzeig specializes in genre-defying recitals that bring together many musical styles, from classical to jazz, popular, ragtime and more. His concerts always include a Scarlatti sonata. These striking juxtapositions, peppered with informative and humorous commentary, create eye-opening programs that change how audiences hear all kinds of music.

David has given up flying to world-wide concert venues; an action he is taking in response to the climate crisis. The gigs he now does are close by, and he travels in his solar-powered EV. He hopes his actions will inspire others to do their small part-whatever it may be--to combat the climate crisis.

Maple Broadband Service Launched!

2023 has kicked off with a bang for Maple Broadband!

The first phase of Maple Broadband's network was completed in 2022. We conducted a soft launch with a few customers in January and early February, culminating with full-service launch in the initial build areas in town: on and around Route 125, Route 30, Route 74, Morse Road, Cider Mill Road, and James Road. Feedback from early customers has been very positive, with all relaying the difference that high-speed broadband has made to their lives. "Being recently connected to Maple Broadband for over three weeks now, we can honestly say that our life has changed in a positive way," said Maple Broadband customer and Select Board member Don Burns.

The 2023 construction season kicks off in April. The next areas of Cornwall to be built are Sperry Road, Ledge Lane, Robbins Road, Route 30 as far south as Clark Road, Clark Road, Route 74, Audet Road, and a portion of South Bingham Street. Other areas are planned for later in the year.

Because Maple Broadband's network is currently paid for exclusively through grant funds, and these funds require that we avoid building areas where another provider has indicated addresses are already served with speeds of 25 Mbps down/3 Mbps up or greater, as a result, there are certain sections of Cornwall that we are not able to build until a later time.
